Well that half-term disappeared in the blink of an eye!


It's been great to see children getting out on the various trips and sporting events. As the weather brightens up, we are looking forward to more memorable visits for children.

JOIN OUR JOURNEY WE ARE IMPROVING Writing

We are improving...writing by Ms. Jolley and Ms. Kingdon, writing leaders.

We are on a rapid writing improvement journey. At Queen's Park School, we believe that all children are writers. Writing is a life long skill and underpins every aspect of our curriculum. We provide valuable writing opportunities for our children, across all areas of the curriculum.

All children participate in exciting and engaging lessons which cover a range of genres specific to each year group. We have adapted our entire writing process so that it guides children through each stage of writing in a fun and inspiring manner. We have introduced new writing targets that specific for each year group. Learning walls within each classroom have been adapted so that children can use this as a tool when writing. As a school we have invested in brand new high quality texts that we are using as our writing stimulus.

In Year 5, children have written and published a persuasive letter using Holes by Louis Sachar, as the stimulus.

JOIN OUR JOURNEY WE ARE IMPROVING IN... Writing

In year 6 children have written a report on how to survive in the desert, inspired by Bear Grylls life experiences. The children have also enjoyed writing their own survival story using The Survivors text as their stimulus.



Our focus across both key stages is handwriting and presentation. By Y3, we expect all children to be joining their letters.

Tips for supporting writing at home!

- Encourage your child to write a diary that they can share with you.
- Create a writing corner in your home that has pens/pencils, paper and post-it notes to hand as creative prompts.
 - Ask your child what genre of writing they have been focusing on in class and encourage discussions around these genres.
- Encourage your child to put their weekly spelling words into exciting sentences to share with their class teacher.





Subject Update What's happening in...PSHE?

We are pleased that, next half term, the children will be taking part in a series of PSHE lessons based on two topics – "Good To be Me" and "Growing an Anti-Racist School." These lessons have recently been revised and rewritten by a group of Anti-Racist lead teachers, employed by the Brighton and Hove City council, along with the PSHE team and are informed by the newly developed Brighton and Hove City Council's Primary Racial Literacy Curriculum Framework.

This work is part of the Council's Anti-Racist Strategy, whose vision is to create a community of anti-racist education settings where:

- •the complexities of our diverse interwoven histories are acknowledged,
- •where every child can learn and thrive,
- •where everyone feels safe and equal
- •where we all have a strong sense of identity and belonging.

The framework is structured around five key themes:


- 1. Physical features (skin colour, hair texture and other physical characteristics)
- 2. Identity, community, culture, ethnic heritage & religion
- 3. Stereotypes, stereotyping and assumptions
- 4. Prejudice and discrimination
- 5. Historical context and structural issues.


Anti-racist education, like all our equalities education, is always appropriate to pupils' ages and stages of development and is an essential part of safeguarding.

All teachers at Queens Park Primary School have been recently trained in Racial Literacy themselves and have had further training on how to deal with questions around race and racism. At Queens Park Primary School, we have been careful to listen to pupil, parent and teacher voice through surveys and meetings.



The campaign reminded me of why – as a parent, a long time ago - I decided to get involved in our school's governing body: A core belief that this school is a vital hub of our community worth fighting for. Since then, it has been an absolute joy to be involved in the school's improvement journey.

Did you know?



What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

Roblox is one of the most popular video games on the market. By 2020, the game's makers were claiming that more than half of children in the USA play it. As a 's and box' title, Roblox offers a huge amount of creative freedom; it lets players create their own gaming experiences with the Roblox Studio to build custom levels and games, which can then be shared with other players online. Roblox fosters creative thinking and enjoys a robust online community of fans.

which allow people to play exclusively which allow people to play exclusively with their friends, but this costs money. Wost Robiox players will instead be on public servers that anyone can join. Servers can host games which focus on all kinds of aspects, including direct player interaction. Some games and servers, therefore, will put children more at risk of contact from strangers than others.

ONLINE DATERS

These are also called 'Opers'
and are quite common in Roblox. An
Oper is an individual who joins a game with
the intention of finding someone to date
online — and eventually meet in person. Suc
online dating is against the Roblox
community guidelines, but this usually

IN-APP PURCHASES

Roblox is actually free to download and play, but bear in mind that there are some hidden costs. Players are encouraged to make purchases in the game, for example, using real money, People can also buy extra Robus (the in-game currency) to spend officosmetic items in the game, while it's possible to purdituse a privator VIP server.



SET PARENTAL CONTROLS

Roblox comes with several parental control options, which are explained well on the game's official website. It's essential to enter the correct date of birth for your child, as that allows Roblox to automatically apply the appropriate chat filters. The game also allows parents and carers to set monthly spending restrictions and monitor their child's account.

MISARI E DRINATE MESSAGING

Roblox's private messaging function raises the risk of children being contacted by people they may not want to speak with — potentially leading to bullying, harassment, toxicity and scam attempts. The game allows you to disable messages from anyone who hasn't been added as a friend on your child's account.

PRIVAJE SERVERS

If your child has some genuine friends to play Roblox online with, paying for a private or VIP server decreases the risk of contact from strangers. Even then, however, some players could invite other people – who might not necessarily be child friendly – into the private server. If your child is a Roblox fan, it's important to talk with them regularly about who they are playing the game with.

MONITOR SPENDING

If they don't understand they're using real money, it's easy for children to accidentally spend a sizeable amount in the game. Using parental controls to place limits on their spending will help avoid any nasty financial surprises. Ensuring that you have two-factor authentication on your payment accounts also makes it harder for your child to spend money inadvertently.

DEALING WITH STRANGERS

At some point in their development, your child will need to learn how to deal with strangers online. Show them how to block and report any users who are upsetting them or asking uncomfortable questions. Talking to them about what's OK to discuss — and what they should never tell a stranger online — will help them understand how to communicate with other people online safety.
